INTRODUCTION

The pre-work will jump start your thinking, prepare your heart and lay some foundations for what will happened during the Boot Camp. - What can I expect?

Understanding the "who" of our mission

- What other spiritual influences have been seen on campus?

Understanding His vision for your mission

- Asking God to bless our plans is such a limited approach to ministry. Jesus modeled ministry by being in-tune with what "the Father was doing." Paul prays for the Ephesians that the "eyes of their heart may be enlightened." In this short section you will begin to ask God to reveal his vision for your campus.
- Read the following accounts of God revealing what He wants to do and record your observations. What specific assignment did he give to each person? How long did it take for this vision take to be fulfilled.
 - Gen 13:14-18
 - Joshua 1:1-11
- Acts 26:12-19

Discovering His Vision

- Vision is a snapshot of the future from God's perspective.
- He reveals it to you as you pray, listen and explore the call to plant a XA group with Him.
- Vision describes what God's particular assignment for you looks like when it is complete.

Receiving and writing your vision for your campus

- Ask God what He wants to do through the Chi Alpha He's called you to plant.
 Keep a journal of the things He deposits into your heart.
